

A Message from the Pastor

Dear friends in Christ,

One of my favorite things to do on a snowy winter afternoon is to flip through seed catalogs. It's fun to think about what we will plant and when different things will sprout and bloom. (I just have to be careful not to give in to the temptation to order one of everything!) It's fun to imagine how the garden will look in different parts of the spring, summer, and fall. Above all, seed catalogs remind me that winter won't last forever, that the days will get longer and the sun will get warmer, that spring will eventually arrive. Like all of gardening, flipping through seed catalogs is an exercise in hope.

Maybe that's why Jesus used so many agricultural and gardening metaphors to teach the gospel. Like gardening, the gospel is all about hope. It's about trusting that what we see is not all there is. It's about believing in the slow, hidden, but inexorable work of God. It's about nurturing and enabling growth, and at the same time trusting that the growth is a gift from God.

Over the year to come, I plan to use this space to look at some of Jesus' metaphors about gardening and growth, and to explore what they can tell us about nurturing our own faith and the faith of those around us. For now, I'll leave you with a few questions to reflect on:

What planting or gardening metaphors do you remember from the Gospels?

Which ones resonate with you, and why? Which ones don't, and why?

What kind of growth do you hope for in your faith garden this year? What can you do to help nurture that growth?


Reconciling in Christ Task Force

EPIPHANY

Epiphany means “appearance or manifestation.” Throughout the world, Christians celebrate it on January 6 - 12 days after Christmas Day. Many countries refer to it as “Three Kings Day.” On this day, Western Christianity recognizes Christ’s manifestation to the Gentiles. The Gentiles, represented when The Magi visited the child Jesus and showed how God’s gift of the Good News is for all people. Eastern Christianity observes Jesus’ baptism on this day. His baptism revealed his identity to mankind. In the East or the West, Epiphany celebrates God revealing himself to the world.

What Was the Significance of Each of the Magi’s Gifts?

- 1. Gold** is a precious metal that has been used for jewelry, ornaments, currency, and idols throughout human history because of its color and shine.
- 2. Frankincense** is an expensive fragrance or perfume made from trees in India and Arabia.
- 3. Myrrh** is a specific kind of costly perfume made from rare thorn bushes in Arabia and Ethiopia that is used as an antiseptic anointing oil and embalming fluid.
